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**Syllabus**

**I. DESCRIPTION**

This is a fully asynchronous Canvas course that will cover the foundations of Korean vocabulary and grammar relevant in daily life and familiarize students with aspects of Korean culture. This course will also introduce and explore basic terminology and expressions within the context of Unificationist texts and culture.

This level is for students with little to no prior knowledge of Korean and serves as an introductory class for further Korean studies. Students will be asked to familiarize themselves with Hanguk (the Korean alphabet) prior to the start of the semester. Resources for learning Hanguk will be emailed to students upon registration of the course.

**II. OUTCOMES**

Upon the completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Have a basic command of the Korean alphabet and Korean pronunciation
2. Correctly utilize basic Korean grammatical structure to form simple sentences
3. Identify and recognize familiar terminology and expressions within the context of the Unification faith
4. Perform simple daily conversations including greetings, self-introductions and common expressions
5. Identify the basics of Korean culture and etiquette and its influence on Unificationism

**III. REQUIREMENTS/EVALUATION**

1. Class participation/weekly assignments (40%)
2. Midterm (30%)
3. Final Exam (30%)

This is a fully asynchronous Canvas course. There will not be weekly live Zoom meetings, and students will be required to listen to lectures and complete assignments each week using Canvas. Students will receive a class participation grade based on submitted assignments. Late submissions and/or unexcused absences will reduce the class participation grade. Midterm and final exams will cover material introduced in Canvas. Grades for the course will not be changed nor incomplete grades granted unless there are personal circumstances which made completion of course requirements impossible. Additional work submitted to improve grades after completion of the course will not be accepted.

## **V. TEXTS**

There is no required text for this course. Course content will be accessible through videos and content posted in the Canvas course. At the end of this course, you will have learned all of the grammar covered in Sun Moon University’s Korean Language Institute’s Beginner Level 1 Textbook.

While no textbook purchase is required, students should have a notebook to take notes and practice writing in Korean. Additional handouts will also be made available through Canvas.

Students do not need to purchase a dictionary for this course. This course will introduce students to the online Naver dictionary, and students will have the option to either purchase [Hangul keyboard stickers](#) or use an [online keyboard typer](#).

## VI. PLAN OF LECTURES

**Because this course will not dedicate much time to the basics of the Korean alphabet (Hangul), students will need to familiarize themselves with the alphabet before the first day of class.**

This is a fully asynchronous Canvas course. There will not be weekly live Zoom meetings, and students will be required to listen to lectures and complete assignments each week using Canvas. Each week's assignment will consist of a written worksheet and an audio submission (reading a few assigned sentences), which can be recorded directly in Canvas. The midterm and final exams are multiple choice.

The exact schedule and weekly content is subject to change. Please refer to the Canvas course modules for the most up-to-date content and course progression.
